	We do not necessarily need an official certificate from Erasmus+ students, but we expect them to have the levels mentioned above. Erasmus+ students can send us an alternative qualification (i.e. statement issued by the Home University, language centres/schools) to demonstrate the level.

Online application and admission	In our online application students are prompted to submit course requests and to download a nomination form for their home university co-ordinator to sign. Once an application is complete, if the student meets the admission criteria, course requests are forwarded to the faculties for evaluation. A student must be admitted to several specific courses before an offer of admission can be extended. We recommend that students not book flights or make other travel plans before receiving their offer of admission. In addition to their desired courses, students should also select at least 3 alternative courses in case their first choices are not all approved.	
	Please note: In the course of the academic year 2020-2021 Leiden University will introduce an online nomination procedure. Our partners will receive detailed information about the new procedure in due time.

PRE DEPARTURE

Website for international students	This website with information on life in the Netherlands and practical matters such as Visa, Housing and Financial Matters will help students prepare their stay.
Housing	Like many universities in the Netherlands, Leiden University does not have a central campus or student dormitories. Instead, our faculties are spread throughout the cities of Leiden and The Hague and students live in accommodation rented via housing organisations and landlords. Prospective students should start to explore ways of finding accommodation well before arriving in the Netherlands to begin their studies. In general, students are expected to arrange their own housing.
	The Leiden University Housing Office does reserve a limited number of rooms for international students each year, but due to high demand and limited availability, the Housing Office cannot guarantee accommodation to all applicants.
	Prospective students are thus advised to apply for housing in a very early stage, and to pay the housing application fee (€350) as early as possible after application, and well before the housing application deadline of June 1st for the Fall semester and November 15th for the Spring semester. There is no need to await a decision on their application for admission to Leiden University.

Visa and residence permits	Holders of EU passports do not require a residence permit to study at Leiden University. Students with a non-EU nationality must have a residence permit and in many cases an entry visa as well. Once a student has been admitted to Leiden University, the International Relations Office will work with the student to apply on their behalf. Students should note that there is a fee of €171 for visas/permits (this fee is subject to change) and strict deadlines for submission of documents.

Insurance	All students are obliged to have health insurance to cover any medical costs incurred during their stay. We strongly recommend that students ensure they have medical insurance before their arrival. Students are also highly recommend to take out liability insurance to cover any accidental damage caused to other persons or property.
Estimated living expenses	On average, students will need at least €928 – €1378 per month. Please note that public transport is not free for exchange students, but discount cards are available.

Orientation:	Leiden University organises two orientation programmes:	
Leiden and the Hague	Orientation Week Leiden – OWL - is the orientation programme to help new international students settle in and find their way around Leiden and the university.	
	The Hague Orientation Programme – HOP - is the orientation programme organized for Dutch and international students who study in The Hague, to help them discover city life, student life and university life of our Campus in The Hague.	
	The orientation programme fee is \in 85 for participation in August and \in 50 for participation in January. These fees are subject to change.	
	Participation in either	OWL or HOP is obligatory – and great fun!
Intake Session	To help students settle in and make sure they are on track with the various formalities, they will attend an intake session with Humanities International Office in the first week of the semester. The students will receive an invitation for an appointment.	
Residence Life Programme (RLP)	Students living in university provided international accommodation in Leiden, Oegstgeest, and The Hague can rely on Resident Assistants living in their buildings. The Resident Assistants try to create a home away from home for the new tenants by organizing community building events, lending a sympathetic ear, and helping them with issues or questions they may be experiencing. They also function as a contact point, referring them to the appropriate Student Support Services, and as a liaison between DUWO, the Housing Office, and the interests of the tenants.	
International Student Network (ISN)	ISN organizes cultural and social events for international and internationally- oriented students in Leiden; a great way to make friends and get involved!

Dutch language and customs	Language courses are not available as regular exchange programme courses. The University's Academic Language Centre offers Dutch language courses for a fee, and the International Student Network offers short courses as well. However, international students can register for the free online Dutch language course Dutch & More, which has been developed for international students. Once they have completed the SPOC successfully, they can register for the Dutch 1B course at Leiden's Academic Language Centre for just 75 euros.
Student life	Leiden and The Hague are vibrant student cities with a rich student life and plenty of sports and cultural activities.

Student Support Services	The student support services desk is the student information point at Plexus Student Centre in Leiden, where students can go for information about study options, study skills and any other study-related matters. In The Hague, students are welcome at Beehive Student Centre for the services provided by Student Support Services. ACADEMIC

Academic calendar	The academic year officially runs from September 1 through to August 31. All faculties follow a semester calendar: the first semester lasts from September until December/January. The second semester courses start in February.	
Recommended arrival week (in order to benefit from the Warm Welcome Service and settle in prior to orientation)	1st semester:	mid-August (please check the Warm Welcome Service dates)
	2nd semester:	Third week of January (please check the Warm Welcome Service dates)

	2nd semester, from / to:	Please note that housing contracts for the Spring semester go until August. July and August are typically months for exam resits.
Courses available to non-degree students	 Students should check the e-Prospectus under "Exchange" for information on course content, language of instruction, pre-requisites, semester dates and assessment. In case of doubt they should contact the Humanities International Office. Students have to take at least 20 ECTS in Humanities courses per semester in the subject area in the agreement and can take courses in other areas, provided the departmental coordinator agrees. Approval for the courses always depends on space and pre-requisites. The BA International Studies and Urban Studies courses are held in the Hague. Although combining courses in both Leiden and The Hague is complicated (12 minutes from Leiden by train, but take about 45 minutes travelling time in account), students may also choose other Humanities courses which are held in Leiden. However, students should take the majority of their courses in one location. 	
Languages of instruction	English and Dutch	
Credit and grading	Leiden University uses the ECTS credit transfer system. Most courses carry a load of 5 or 10 ECTS credits. As is common in the Netherlands, the top grades of 9 and 10 are rarely given. A grading table will be provided on all transcript of records. Please check the website for more information on the grading table.	
Standard course load	15-30 ECTS per semester for non-degree students. 30 ECTS is the standard full-time semester load for degree students. 1 ECTS credit equals 28 hrs of study, including contact hours and self-study.	
Course registration	Course approval occurs at the time of admission to the exchange program. This process reserves students a place in the approved courses. Registration for approved courses in our online registration system occurs prior to the start of the semester. This process differs per faculty; students will receive further instructions close to the start of the semester.	
	Students should always contact the exchange coordinator with questions about courses and course applications.	
	They are not allowed to contact the lecturers directly. Application for courses closes about 4 weeks before the start of the semester. The Faculty of Humanities will

	register the students for their Humanities courses. There is no add/drop period. Changes are only possible in case of schedule clashes. Students will receive further instructions close to the start of the semester.
	Questions regarding course registration after arrival can be discussed during the intake session.
	1st semester: exams and resits are scheduled from mid December until the end of January
Examinations	2nd semester: exams and resists are scheduled from mid May until the beginning of July
	Students are required to be available for all exams and resits. If your semester starts before February and your student must have returned before February, we advise to only nominate students for the Spring semester or for one year.
	During the semester, students will have a Transcript Request Appointment with their International Programmes Officer.
Transcript issuance	Transcripts will be issued:
	- for Fall students: mid-February to mid-March
	- for Spring and Full-Year students: mid-June to end of August

Faculty of Humanities | Leiden University

Requirements

Field of study Erasmus+ contract

We can only accept students nominated in the field of study as stated in our bilateral exchange agreement and within the Faculty of Humanities. Students must take at least 20 ECTS per semester in courses offered in the Faculty of Humanities in the field of study mentioned in the exchange agreement. On top of that, students are allowed to take courses in other fields of studies, provided the programme coordinators can accept them.

Please note that for the Erasmus code for history and archeology (0222/225) this only concerns History. Archeology is a separate faculty at Leiden University with its own Erasmus agreements.

Language acquisition courses

Our language acquisition courses are not open to exchange students unless stated otherwise in the eprospectus. This is due to the limited capacity of the groups and/or because the language of instruction and/or course materials are in Dutch.

In a very few cases there are a few places left after all students enrolled in the full programme have been placed, but we cannot guarantee this and we know this just before the start of the semester. To avoid problems and disappointment, students should not count on enrolment in a language course for their study plans or requirements of the home university.

Our language Centre offers courses in various languages. Please be aware that for these courses a fee is charged and no credits are awarded for them (more information: <u>http://hum.leiden.edu/languagecentre/</u>)

English language requirements:

To be able to follow our courses in English successfully and make assignments, write papers and take exams, the students should have a level of IELTS Academic test: at least 6.5 / TOEFL test: 90 (internet-based) or 575 (paper-based) (CEFR B2 bachelor; C1 master courses). Please visit the <u>website</u> for the most up to date information.

We do not necessarily need an official certificate from Erasmus+ students, but we expect them to have the levels mentioned above. Erasmus+ students can send us an alternative qualification (i.e. statement issued by the Home University, language centres/schools) to demonstrate the level.

Course in Leiden and The Hague

While the majority of Humanities programmes and courses are offered in Leiden, it is important to realize that the BA International Studies (BAIS) programme is in the Hague. The Hague is 10-12 minutes by train, and about 45 minutes door-to-door from the faculty's buildings in Leiden. We do not recommend students to combine courses in Leiden and The Hague. We advise to take all courses either in Leiden or in The Hague as it is very difficult to arrange courses in both cities without schedule clashes. When combining courses in Leiden and the Hague, students should take the time and travel expenses into account.

Housing

It is very important for students who will be starting their exchange in Leiden in Fall 2020, to <u>apply for</u> <u>housing through the Housing Office</u> and to pay the housing fee as soon as possible after submitting their online application for exchange, even if they have not been formally admitted to Leiden University yet. Accommodation is allocated on a "first come first served" basis, and a student's place on the housing list is determined by the date on which their housing fee is received.

Please note that even an early application does not guarantee housing.
