## PRACTICAL MATTERS

### ACADEMIC YEAR AND TERM DATES

CEU follows a trimester system with the following terms:

- **Fall Term:** September – December
- **Winter Term:** January – March
- **Spring Term:** April – June

### NOMINATION

- **April 15 for Fall Term and Full Academic Year**
- **October 15 for Winter and Spring Terms**

Nomination forms are sent directly to coordinators, who will initiate the process accordingly. Please reach out to the Erasmus+ Coordinator of your home institution.

**Students can be nominated for all terms or for the full academic year. Some specific regulations apply for winter and spring term:**

- Graduate (MA) and doctoral (PhD) students may apply for the Winter and Spring Term separately. However, since the Spring term is mainly for thesis writing and individual consultations, few courses are offered, and students may not earn the required credits.
- Undergraduate (BA) students can only be nominated for the combined Winter and Spring terms, which represent a single semester spot.

### APPLICATION

Students will be assigned to a specific **CEU department**, which will be their host department. **Admission is not automatic**; all nominated students must submit an application. The host department evaluates applications based on their quality, academic performance, and English proficiency.

Nominated students will receive the details about the application process via email. Once your home university approves your nomination to study at CEU, you must prepare and submit your application via the link you get after nomination

The deadline for submitting applications for the Fall Term is **April 30**.

The deadline for Winter and Spring Terms applications is **October 31**.

## Application Requirements

Your application must be submitted without exception in English and include the following documents:

- Completed Application Form
- Study Plan
- Proof of English language proficiency (if applicable) \*
- Statement of Purpose / Motivation Letter
- Curriculum Vitae (CV)
- Official or certified transcript of all completed semesters from your current higher education institution
  - *If the transcript is not in English, a certified English translation is required*

All applications are processed by the **CEU Admissions Office**.

## ENGLISH PROFICIENCY

### Accepted Proof of English Proficiency for Erasmus Applicants:

- Standardized test scores (e.g. TOEFL, IELTS, Cambridge) at CEFR level B2 or C1 (or equivalent)

You are exempted from the requirement of proving your English skills if:

- English is your native language
- You have completed a Bachelor's or Master's degree taught entirely in English
- Your home institution certifies your level of English according to the CEFR

To request an exemption, include a written request in your application package. Exemptions are granted at the discretion of the department's admissions committee and will be confirmed after the first stage of the selection process.

## VISA

## ACADEMIC MATTERS

### **The 50% Rule**

Erasmus students are required to complete 50% of their coursework within the host department. This percentage refers to the overall workload measured in ECTS credits, not the number of individual courses.

Please note that incoming PhD students must have a CEU supervisor arranged before their arrival. For assistance, they should contact the relevant **CEU department**.

## DEPARTMENTS

At CEU, academic life is organized into departments, each focusing on a specific field of study — ranging from Political Science and History to Environmental Sciences and Legal Studies. As an incoming exchange student, you'll be hosted by one department but may take courses across others (depending on availability and approval).

## COURSES

All courses at CEU are taught in English. Most are available to non-degree students within their respective study cycles, although some may have participation limits, prerequisites, or be reserved for specific student groups.

## **Undergraduate Students (Bachelor's)**

The list above includes some Graduate (Master's) courses which are available to undergraduate students. However, please note that some courses have prerequisites, so be sure you meet them before enrolling.

### **Important Course Access Information:**

- *Visual Theory and Practice* courses are **not open** to non-degree (Erasmus+/Exchange/Visiting) students.
- Both course lists include filter options—by department, term, or CIVICA designation—for easier navigation.
- Always prepare backup course options, as some courses may have schedule overlaps.
- Enrollment in selected courses **cannot be guaranteed**, even if the course is a mandatory requirement at your university.

### **Credit System and Course Details:**

- All credits at CEU follow the U.S. credit system (1 US credit = 2 ECTS).

### **Please note:**

- If a course is not listed on the webpage, it is likely new and awaiting a course description from the instructor.
- If you see a course on the webpage that is not included in the official course lists, it is **not available** to non-degree students.

Students should take courses primarily hosted by their host department.

Please keep in mind that admission to courses is not automatic: some courses have prerequisites.

Most graduate level courses are open to incoming Erasmus students, however there are some exceptions. Always check the [course description](#) to see if a course is available to you before adding it to your Study Plan.

## ORIENTATION AND ARRIVAL

To help you settle in and get to know life at CEU, the university offers a series of **Pre-session Orientation programs**. These sessions are designed to introduce you to the academic environment and student life at CEU.

**Orientation Week**, organized by the **Student Center**, is tailored for newly arrived students. It supports your transition to living in Vienna and studying at CEU through a range of events and activities. The program provides essential information about your studies and is a great opportunity to meet fellow students and explore both the university and the city.

During the Pre-session Orientation, you'll also be introduced to available courses in your host department, and **course registration will take place during this period**.

## GRADING

At the start of each semester, students have the right to know what is expected of them in every course. To support this, departments and programs provide a detailed **course syllabus** for each class. Also, after admission, you will receive a **Student's Handbook** which contains all relevant information regarding exams among others.

Keep in mind, that exams are administered during term time

## TRANSCRIPTS

Transcripts are official documents listing the courses you have completed and your results. They are prepared by the Student Records Office and include your CEU grades along with ECTS credits, which count toward your degree at your home university.

Transcripts are sent directly to the student after all grades have been submitted and leaving formalities have been completed.
