Nicola Casarini is Senior Associate Fellow at the Istituto Affari Internazionali (IAI) in Rome and Global Fellow at the Wilson Center in Washington DC. He earned a doctorate in international relations from the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE), majoring on Europe-China relations and their implications for East Asia's security. He has held positions at the Graduate Institute in Geneva, at the EU Institute for Security Studies in Paris, at Bocconi University in Milan, at Seoul National University, at the European University Institute in Florence, and at the LSE. Since 2004, he has visited regularly and spent research periods in: China, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, and the United States.

His research interests focus on the politics and international relations of the Indo-Pacific; Europe's relations with Asian countries; Transatlantic relations and Asia, with particular attention to the US-China-EU strategic triangle. He is the author of the monograph *Remaking Global Order: The Evolution of Europe-China Relations and its Implications for East Asia and the United States* (Oxford University Press, 2009); editor of various volumes, including: *Promoting Security Cooperation and Trust Building in Northeast Asia* (Nuova Cultura, 2017).

In the last years, he has researched - and organized various conferences - on Europe's relations with the Korean Peninsula and on the EU's distinctive involvement in the North Korea's nuclear dossier, publishing several articles and chapters, as well as two edited books: *EU-Korea Security Relations* (Routledge, 2022); and *The Routledge Handbook of Europe-Korea Relations* (Routledge, 2022), the latter co-edited with Antonio Fiori, Nam-Kook Kim, Jae-Seung Lee, Ramon Pacheco Pardo.
